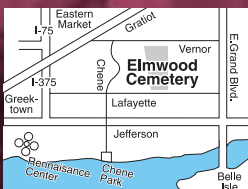

Message from Francis W. "Sandy" McMillan

President – Elmwood Cemetery

In recent weeks, a number of cemeteries in the Detroit area have been in the news. The State Attorney General has secured a court order to place these cemeteries under the control of a conservator to protect the assets of the cemeteries. We are pleased the regulators have stepped in to protect and assist the lot holders in these cemeteries.

We want to assure you that Historic Elmwood is NOT one of the cemeteries subject to the Attorney General's court order. Our financial reports are entirely in order and we have the resources necessary to maintain Elmwood at the highest standards. We are very proud of the art, architecture, history and horticulture within our grounds. We are fully aware of our responsibility to preserve memories for all of our lot holders perpetually.

Please feel free to call or visit our offices with any questions, concerns or suggestions you may have regarding your lot or the cemetery generally. We deeply appreciate your trust in Elmwood.

Upcoming Activities

• *This month, Allen Barksdale, Jr. hosts an informative Underground*

Railroad Tour. He will highlight those interred at Elmwood who were instrumental in helping slaves achieve their freedom. If you are interested in joining a tour, please call the office for available times. It is a walking tour, so please be prepared for Michigan winter weather.

• *Spring planting.* If you, your friends or garden club are interested in adding to the beauty of the cemetery, there are many areas that will be available for flowers. Please call Joan Capuano for more information.

• *Do you enjoy running, walking, or biking* with a group of friends? Please consider using Elmwood's pathways. The office staff would be happy to make arrangements for a time that best works for you.

Due to a generous donation, we now have benches positioned in various locations. Bring your binoculars and bird watching guide. We hope to establish feeding stations in the future.

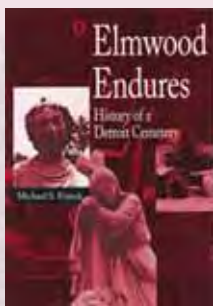
• *Horticulturists* will be delighted by the variety of trees and plantings on the Cemetery grounds. We are establishing a tree identification program and hope to be able to place markers throughout the Cemetery that note the many varieties by both their scientific and common names.

• *Tours of the Cemetery* are available on a regular basis. Elmwood Cemetery is steeped in history, art and natural beauty. We host hundreds of people each year for tours including school groups, seniors, community groups, religious organizations and special interest groups. Theme tours are available or we can tailor a tour specifically for your group. Walking tours may be scheduled for groups of ten or more. Bus tours, as well as school tours, of forty individuals or less, can also be accommodated. Advance reservations are required for all group tours. Please contact Joan Capuano to arrange a tour. Elmwood Tours have been developed to explore specific themes including: Michigan Governors, Michigan Senators, Past Detroit Mayors, Civil War Generals, Black Heritage Leaders, Underground Railroad, Detroit's Who's Who, Memorial Art and Symbolism, and Trees.

Please Remember

To help keep Elmwood enjoyable for all, we ask everyone - lot owners, families and visitors - to follow these important rules and regulations. The complete Rules and Regulations pamphlet is available from our office or as a download off our website.

1. Visiting hours for the Cemetery are from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. every day.
2. The speed limit within the Cemetery is fifteen (15) miles per hour. Parking and/or driving on any gardens or grassy areas are prohibited.
3. Dogs must be kept on a leash or in a vehicle at all times.
4. Special rules apply to the planting of fresh flowers and placement of tributes throughout the Cemetery. Please keep in mind that the Cemetery shall have the right to remove all objects whose appearance and condition warrant removal and/or violate the Cemetery's rules and regulations. Please contact our office or refer to the complete list of rules and regulations if you have any questions on items allowed.
5. Fresh floral tributes are welcomed in all outdoor areas. Our office supplies temporary metal vases, free of charge, for your use. Artificial flowers are allowed only in our mausoleums.
6. For safety, glass containers are not permitted in any part of the Cemetery.

Message from Joseph Malburg, Director of Operations – Elmwood Cemetery

In 2006, Elmwood Cemetery served hundreds of families, and I wish to recognize our Grounds and Office Staff for doing an outstanding job throughout the year.

We have added to the number of services we now offer by also providing monuments, markers and outside burial containers. In addition, there are more locations available throughout Elmwood's beautiful grounds, for individual and family lots. Now, we have a wider selection of areas where you have the option of placing a family monument, upright "slant" marker or lawn-level marker. These memorials also may be engraved or have a laser-etched portrait of your loved one.

Our program of Cemetery improvements will continue this year. Our Gatehouse has been beautifully restored. Our Grounds Maintenance Center has a new roof and presently the Historic Chapel is being renovated. We also plan to begin road paving and curb restoration this year.

Regrettably, scores of large and beautiful ash trees have been removed over the past two years due to the Emerald Ash Borer infestation. We are developing plans to add replacement trees throughout the Cemetery.

Message from Joan Frear Capuano, *Executive Director – Historic Elmwood Foundation*

Foundation Projects



Chapel Restoration Fund

We cannot thank you enough for your tremendous response to our fundraising effort. Our goal was to raise \$75,000 to restore the historic Chapel. We are delighted to report that your contributions have achieved 90% of this goal; we have raised \$67,959 as of January 15, 2007! A few significant donations merit special mention: Mrs. Edward I. Book, a former Elmwood Cemetery Trustee and now an honorary member, donated \$5,000;

The Ralph Wilson, Jr. Foundation donated \$10,000; and the Warren, Elizabeth & Alger Shelden Foundation donated \$25,000. We thank these individuals and trustees for their support of Elmwood. These donations made it possible for us to accelerate our timeline for the Chapel restoration. As this newsletter goes to print, roofers are laying the foundation for the new chapel roof.

We greatly appreciate the generosity of all donors. This year brought 48 individuals who donated to Elmwood for the first time. Thank you for choosing to support Elmwood. Additionally, many of our long-time supporters increased the level of their donations. Whether you supported Elmwood with a large or small donation, we could not do without it. It took many donations to raise \$68,000. Again, we thank you for your commitment to Elmwood. We always endeavor to make you proud of our treasure.



Chapel Restoration

In 1855, the Trustees of Elmwood Cemetery commissioned church architects Albert and Octavius Jordan to design a small Chapel for use in burial ceremonies. The Chapel denotes the Norman Gothic Revival period and was completed in 1856. The Chapel was remodeled in the 1960s and then rebuilt following a fire in 1976. The Chapel requires preservation and in 2006, the Foundation Board chose the Chapel as its' top priority. The Chapel Restoration began with removal of our existing roof and sub-structure (pictured). Our contractors will focus on solving the condensation problem that caused the deterioration and mold. They will lay a new substructure, increase venting, and lay a new roof.

Prudent management of the restoration has permitted us to expand the project. We will lay new tile flooring to replace the formica, replace rusted ceiling fans, update necessary electrical, paint the interior and exterior of the chapel and install new gutters. If the budget further permits, we hope to add cleaning and tuck pointing of the exterior stone.

The website will be updated regularly with photos of the work. Please check in. You should also feel free to come by the cemetery and watch the work in progress. The office staff is able to tell you the best time to come. Please be sure to keep a safe distance away from the construction site.



Featured Biographies

Leaders of the Underground Railroad

William Lambert

He's been called "the conductor" of the Underground Railroad, but an interview William Lambert gave to the Detroit Tribune in 1886, just 4 years before his death, shows that he was more aptly a member of its board of directors.

Lambert, who came to Detroit as a cabin boy on a steamboat, was characterized as a man of education, wide reading, rare argumentative power, the founder of a church and a leader of his race.

He created the "African American Mysteries; the Order of the Men of Oppression," a complicated set of rituals that protected the very existence of the Underground Railroad.

Lambert was a friend and confidant of well known abolitionist John Brown, who Lambert insisted was a sane and reasonable man who voluntarily sacrificed himself to fan the flames of liberty.

In an 1890 article in the Detroit Free Press, Lambert was called an indefatigable worker in the cause of anti-slavery and it was at his house that many meetings were held by John Brown and his followers.

At his funeral later that year, the Tribune reported that the church was filled, that many prominent people were present, and that his "remains found their last resting place in Elmwood Cemetery."

Veterans' Day Tribute

Our annual Veterans' Day tribute is a great tradition. Long-time cemetery supporter Mrs. Beulah Hamilton has organized the event for the past 22 years.

The rainy weather on the most recent Veterans' Day did not deter the hundreds who came out to honor our country's veterans. Elmwood's Allen Barksdale, Jr. welcomed the attendees to the ceremony. Members representing the Native American troops and Canadian troops who fought for our country also spoke. As we celebrated all our veterans, members of the Martin Luther King High School marching band played and many ROTC contingents also participated. Flowers and American flags were placed on the graves.

The event was held in Elmwood's Civil War section, where special wreaths were positioned at our Flag post – one of the few authorized to fly, without being lit, 24 hours a day. This is where many members of what was known as the 102nd U.S. Colored Troops rest. According to a Michigan Historical Marker at the Duffield School in Detroit, the 102nd was the First Michigan Colored Regiment, organized at Camp Ward from August through October of 1863. That was a year of draft riots and protests against the war, yet the regiment was composed entirely of volunteers. A regimental band was formed, and toured southern Michigan to recruit additional volunteers. The 900-man unit left Detroit in late March 1864 for service in South Carolina, Georgia and Florida. During its 19 months in the field, more than 1400 men served in the regiment, and 140 died in service.

George DeBaptiste

DeBaptiste, after being forced to leave Indiana because of his antislavery activities, became the personal valet of General William Henry Harrison, whom he accompanied to the White House as a steward.

When he came to Detroit in 1846, he found success as a merchant, and continued to further the cause of freedom as a "the superintendent" of the Underground Railroad, using his ships to transport runaways to freedom in Canada. At the same time he served as a

delegate to the Cleveland National Convention of Colored Citizens, and as an agent for the Freedman's Aid Commission. He worked closely with William Lambert in furthering the fight for equality, attending meetings with John Brown, Frederick Douglass and other leaders.

During the Civil War, he served as an organizer of Michigan's Colored Regiment, and served as provisioner during its campaigns in the South. DeBaptiste died in 1875, and reposes at Elmwood next

to his brother, Benjamin, who fought in Company K, 54th Massachusetts Infantry, the regiment immortalized in the movie "Glory."

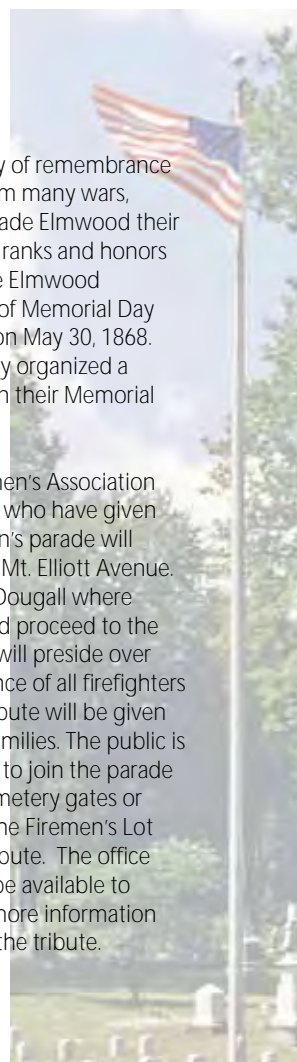

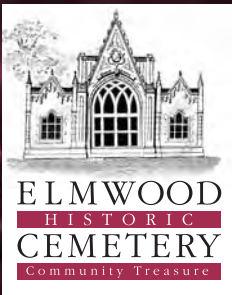
Memorial Day Tribute

Memorial Day has always been an important day of remembrance at Elmwood Cemetery. Heroes and veterans from many wars, dating back to the American Revolution have made Elmwood their final resting place. From privates to generals, all ranks and honors are remembered. A fact little known outside the Elmwood community is that the first national observance of Memorial Day actually took place here at Elmwood Cemetery on May 30, 1868. With only three days' notice, the staff very quickly organized a simple yet meaningful event. Most others began their Memorial Day celebrations the following year, in 1869.

Mark your calendars for the annual Detroit Firemen's Association Memorial Day Tribute! In honor of local firemen who have given their lives in service to our community, a Firemen's parade will begin at 9:00 a.m. at the corner of Lafayette and Mt. Elliott Avenue. The parade will continue down Lafayette to McDougall where participants will enter the Cemetery grounds and proceed to the Firemen's Lot. Detroit Fire Department officials will preside over the ceremony. A bell will be rung in remembrance of all firefighters who have died over the past year and a floral tribute will be given

to their families. The public is welcome to join the parade at the cemetery gates or meet at the Firemen's Lot for the tribute. The office staff will be available to provide more information closer to the tribute.
